

# "First Ashore" Exhibit Opens At The Coronado Library



In commemoration of 70 years of Naval Special Warfare in Coronado, the Coronado Library and Cultural Arts Commission has sponsored an exhibition title "First Ashore" at the Coronado Library which runs from October 6 to December 3, 2016. This was the first part of a three-part tribute to Naval Special Warfare in Coronado, which included a lecture by former NSW Historian Don Crawford and dedication of the Naked Warrior at Glorietta Bay Park on Veterans Day at 1100 hours.

Boat Guys Jim Gary and Phil Garn donated quite a number of items in the exhibition: from a rare World War II Combined Operations patch to an extensive Vietnam and Cold War era collection of Boat Support Unit, MST and SBU patches as well as an original river rat black beret in addition to scale models of a Light Seal Support Craft (LSSC), Patrol Boat River (PBR) and Phil's award winning Seal Team One "Body Snatch" diorama. There are lots of artifacts and photos from World War II to the present with a number of boats, the LSSC, MSSC, Heavy, Sea Fox, Sea Specter, Mk V to name a few. The

exhibit is open to the public during normal library hours seven days a week.

During Don Crawford's well-attended lecture on October 29, 2016 including many legendary frogmen as well as boat guys and former CCCA board members Chuck Chaldekas and Phil Garn, we learned the first UDT guys were actually at NAB Coronado in 1945 demobilizing from the Pacific, typical of NSW, there before anyone knew it. Don traced the evolution of NSW from WWII to Vietnam. Then there was a nice reception afterwards with wine and cheese and free BEER!

The dedication for the Naked Warrior statue was at Glorietta Bay just north of the City Boat House. This was very well attended by frogmen and boat guys from World War II to the present day including Rear Admiral Gary Bonelli, Randy Large (CO of SBU-13 and Det Commander in SBU-12), Chuck Chaldekas and Phil Garn (Phil thought he saw Admiral Richards from a distance but not sure as there was a pretty big crowd). During Rear Admiral Timothy Szymanski's remarks, the Commander of Naval Special Warfare Command highlighted the contribution of "Special Boat Operators" (that's us!) to the Naval Special Warfare community as well as SEALs. Marcus Lutrell was invited to help unveil the statute along with Admiral Bonelli and others. It was a sunny day and great opportunity to get to chat with old comrades and their families. There was a super reception with sliders, hot dogs chicken and potato salad at the boathouse, but sadly no beer.

The exhibit at the Coronado Public Library, 640 Orange Avenue, runs through December 3, 2016. If you are in town, check the hours and have a look. The statue is just south of the Coronado Recreation Center and public boat ramp.

# **The Mini-Armored Troop Carrier**

#### **MATC General Characteristics**




The mini-armored troop carrier is a high-speed shallow draft combat craft designed for special warfare support operations in river and coastal environments. Thirty-six feet long and thirteen feet wide, the flat-bottom design provides only a two-foot draft when combat loaded and carrying sixteen troops. On step it draws even less. The mini-ATC is equipped with communications equipment, radar and weapon bases which can accommodate a wide variety of weapon combinations to suit the mission. Its engines are shock mounted and acoustically insulated to provide exceptionally quiet operation. With a full

load of 431 gallons of fuel in two tanks (392 gallons in newer craft), the mini-ATC has a full-speed range of about 00 miles. The entire troop compartment is protected by armor plating and a spall blanket. At combat draft, the boat is only about four feet high above the water with the canopy and radar mast down.

The mini-ATC is designed for a two-man crew, but normally four men are assigned to provide more flexibility, firepower and effectiveness.)

This craft was re-engine with 6V-92 TA's in the late 80's with engines from the retiring SWCL's (Seafox)







FIGURE 3-1. "EXTERIOR — MATC (Side View)"


#### Weapons

The MATC is capable of mounting various combinations of the following weapons: .50 cal machine gun, M-60 machine gun, MK-19 grenade launcher/machine gun, MK-20 grenade launcher/machine gun, 60mm mortar.

#### **Propulsion Pumps**

The mini-ATC is propelled by two twenty-inch Jacuzzi model 20YJ pumps driven by a flexible drive shaft from the transmission. (See Figure 3-9.) In addition to providing propulsion, the pumps provide cooling water to the hydraulic systems.

Each Jacuzzi pump takes water in through a grilled intake in the hull and forces it through a nozzle below the water line at the stern. The jet stream is deflected left or right to steer the boat and a reverse gate is dropped which directs the stream beneath the boat for reverse thrust. An inspection cover on each pump permits removal of trash or debris which may be sucked up the intake.



#### The 81mm MORTAR

#### General

The 81mm Mortar was intended to be tripod mounted on small craft, provides a recoil counter-recoul mechanism for reducing brake loading, and is designed for free-swing in train and elevation or field position firing. It can be drop-fired or trigger-fired for bombardment, laying smoke, providing night illumination, direct fire at close range, or indirect harassment and interdiction fire. It can be fired by one man, but two men usually perform these duties. High Explosire, White Phosphorous and Illumination ammunition is provided, as

in the 60 mm Mortar. The maximum range is 8000 yards, maximum effective range is 5000 yards, and a good crew can maintain a firing rate of 10 rounds per minute.







Figure 11-7.—81 mm mortar and piggyback .50 caliber machine gun.

# From the Membership Chairman:

Greetings to the team!

Our membership is looking strong and getting stronger. We're currently mustering 273 boat guys in our ranks. Data reaching back to June 2016 when we started our new membership system tells us that we've received 94 membership renewals, 12 new members and unfortunately, 3 members declined to renew. Our new system is working! Now the bad news.....Of our 273 muster, 143 members, or 52% of our total membership, are expired. We're giving them a patient opportunity to renew but will need to move on without them soon. On the positive side of that, we've improved our delinquent count from 81% in June, down to 52% today. Not included in that 52% are the number of calls and emails I've received over the past few days from members letting me know they've just re-upped. Once I get the nod from our Treasurer, I'll add them to the list.

What can you do to help? Ensure that we have up to date contact info for you. I send out email reminders, postal reminders, and even send messages to folks via Facebook. I'm not convinced that I'm reaching everyone though.

If you have a computer and surf the internet occasionally, consider creating a free Facebook account. We have a private, member's only page there and that is where a bulk of our communications go out to the membership. This new newsletter will hopefully reach all those who aren't on the internet.

Also, you can help by bringing in new members. I'd really like to see our muster hit 300 by January 1, 2017. That's only 27 new members. An achievable goal given the 273 members we have. Only 10% of the membership bringing in 1 new member each in a 6 week timeframe.
